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#### TO THE DIRECTOR

Careful attention to a solid 8/8 feel is the key to making **Estancia** successful. Once the rhythm section creates a good sense of time and the horn players lock into the eighthnote feel, the chart should fall together well.

The introduction should be strong. Be careful that the sustaining unison voices don't overshadow the line in the trumpets and altos. All articulations in mm. 9-24 should be crisp. The band break in m. 21 should feel very tight as well. The attention to time at m. 25 should make the three lines hook up well.

Any soloist may take the solo break at m. 46 and continue into the solo section at m. 47. There are written solo examples provided, and this section may be opened up for more solos as desired. Backgrounds may be cued as well. Encourage young players to give improvisation a try here.

After the final solo, cue the last time ending to go on to m. 56. All brass articulations should be tight and crisp here. The D.S. and a short coda take the chart home.

**Doug Beach** has built a career that includes performing (trumpet), teaching, adjudicating, publishing and composing. Inspired by his interest in playing, writing and teaching, in 1975 he established the publishing company which bears his name. Three years later, Doug joined the faculty of Elmhurst College in Illinois as jazz band director; in the years since, his band has toured Europe often (twice at the invitation of the U.S. State Department) and has appeared with jazz greats Clark Terry, Diane Schuur, Louie Bellson, Bobby Shew and others. In great demand as a clinician and adjudicator throughout the U.S. and Canada, Doug has also been artist-in-residence on two different occasions for the Illinois Arts Council.
